A Spy Called James

The Contributions and Legacy of Armistead Lafayette during the American Revolution

Subject: History and Social Sciences, Language Arts

Grade Level: Fourth Grade

Topic: The Civil Rights Movement in Virginia; Brown vs the Board of Education

Guiding Questions: How did James Armistead Lafayette's actions as a spy impact the outcome of

the American Revolution and what challenges did he face in his guest for

freedom?

Objectives: Students will understand the contributions of James Armistead Lafayette

during the American Revolution.

Students will analyze primary sources related to James Armistead Lafayette. Students will create a timeline of key events in James Armistead Lafayette's

life.

Students will discuss the importance of spies during the American Revolution.

VA SOL: VS.1. The student will demonstrate skills for historical thinking, geographical

analysis, economic decision making, and responsible citizenship by:

a) analyzing and interpreting artifacts and primary and secondary

sources to understand events in history;

b) analyzing the impact of geographic features on people, places, and events to support an understanding of events in Virginia history;

c) interpreting charts, graphs, and pictures to determine characteristics of people, places, or events in Virginia history;

d) recognizing and explaining the interrelationships among people,

places, and events in Virginia history;

VS.5: The student will demonstrate an understanding of the role of Virginia in the American Revolution by:

a) identifying the reasons why the colonies went to war with Great

Britain as expressed in the Declaration of Independence. b) identifying the various roles played by Virginians in the

Revolutionary War era, with emphasis on James Armistead Lafayette.

Materials: A Spy Called James by Anne Rockwell

Chart paper and markers

Primary source documents from the Library of Congress (letters, maps, images

related to James Armistead Lafayette)

Timeline worksheet


Access to computers/tablets for accessing online primary sources

Day 1: Introduction to James Armistead Lafayette

- 1. Introduction (10 minutes)
 - Begin with a brief discussion about the American Revolution and the role of spies.
 - Introduce the book "A Spy Called James" by Anne Rockwell and provide some background information about James Armistead Lafayette.

2. Read Aloud (30 minutes)

- Read "A Spy Called James" aloud to the class.
- Pause periodically to ask comprehension questions and discuss key points from the story.



- Discuss the significance of James Armistead Lafayette's contributions.
- Talk about the challenges he faced as an enslaved person and how he gained freedom.
- Use notes cards to jot down important events from book

Day 2: Analyzing Primary Sources

- 1. Review (10 minutes)
 - Review the previous day's discussion and key points from the book.
- 2. Primary Source Analysis (30 minutes) Appendix A, B, C, & D
 - Introduce the primary source documents from the Library of Congress.
 - Divide students into small groups and provide each group with a different primary source related to James Armistead Lafayette (e.g., letters from Marquis de Lafayette, maps of Yorktown, images of Revolutionary War scenes).
 - Have each group analyze their primary source using a worksheet with guiding questions (e.g., What do you see? What does this document tell us about James Armistead Lafayette?).
- 3. Group Presentations (20 minutes)
 - Each group presents their findings to the class.
 - Discuss how these primary sources provide a deeper understanding of James Armistead Lafayette's life and contributions.

Day 3: Creating a Timeline

- 1. Introduction to Timelines (10 minutes)
 - Explain what a timeline is and how it can be used to organize historical events.
- 2. Timeline Activity (30 minutes)

• Provide students with key events from James Armistead Lafayette's life and the American Revolution.



- Have students create a timeline using these events, either on paper or using timeline creation software.
- 3. Reflection and Discussion (20 minutes)
 - Have students share their timelines with the class.
 - Discuss the importance of James Armistead Lafayette's contributions and how spies played a crucial role in the American Revolution.

Optional Extension

- Research other key figures from Virginia during the American Revolution and create biographical posters.
- Write a journal entry from the perspective of James Armistead Lafayette describing his experiences as a spy.



